Alexander Hamilton Park

Weehawken New Jersey

Take Route 3 towards the Lincoln Tunnel and take the last exit in New Jersey. Follow the service road down the hill to the end and make a left onto Boulevard East also named Hudson Boulevard East also named J. F. Kennedy Boulevard East. Follow Boulevard East through an S turn and you will see the New York Skyline and Alexander Hamilton Park.

Good New York City skyline views of midtown Manhattan (the mid forties) from the cliffs of New Jersey. Try it in the beginning of July at sunset for some nice reflected light in the buildings.

Audobon Center

Take the New York State Thruway across the Tappan Zee Bridge to Exit 8 and proceed to Interstate 287, the Cross Westchester Expressway. Take I287 to Exit 9S and follow the signs for the Hutchinson River Parkway / Merrit Parkway towards Connecticut. Proceed on the Merrit Parkway into Greenwich to the Round Hill Road Exit. At the Round Hill Road Exit make a left and follow Round Hill Road for 0.6 miles and make a left onto Old Mill Road. Proceed for 0.9 miles to a T and make a right onto North Porchuck Road. Proceed for 0.1 miles and pass the entrance to the Audobon Fairchild Garden following North Porchuck Road to Riversville Road and make a right. Go to the next intersection which is John Street and the Center is at the intersection.

Some pond life and two bird blinds. The bird blinds were rather disappointing in that they required very long lenses and a tree filter to photograph mostly small birds. There were a number of trails if you like to do a little walking. An interesting side trip if you are going to the Audobon Fairchild Garden but I personally would not go just for the Audobon Center.

Audobon Fairchild Garden

Take the New York State Thruway across the Tappan Zee Bridge to Exit 8 and proceed to Interstate 287, the Cross Westchester Expressway. Take I287 to Exit 9S and follow the signs for the Hutchinson River Parkway / Merrit Parkway towards Connecticut. Proceed on the Merrit Parkway into Greenwich to the Round Hill Road Exit. At the Round Hill Road Exit make a left and follow Round Hill Road for 0.6 miles and make a left onto Old Mill Road. Proceed for 0.9 miles to a T and make a right onto North Porchuck Road. Proceed for 0.1 miles and the entrance is on your left.

The gates close at 5:00 PM but you will have to call to see what time they open.

This is listed as a wildflower garden and there were still plenty of them at the end of May.

Bartlett Arboretum

Take the New York State Thruway across the Tappan Zee Bridge to Exit 8 and proceed to Interstate 287, the Cross Westchester Expressway. Take I287 to Exit 9S and follow the signs for the Hutchinson River Parkway / Merrit Parkway towards Connecticut. Proceed on the Merrit Parkway to Exit 35 High Ridge Road (not Exit 34 Long Ridge Road). At the exit light make a left onto High Ridge Road and follow for 1.6 miles to Brookdale Road and make a left. Follow Brookdale Road for 0.4 miles and you will see the Arboretum entrance.

Walking trails, a swamp, a pond, some cultivated flowers and a greenhouse that is open in the mornings from 9:30 to 11:00.

Batsto Village

Take the New Jersey turnpike to Exit 7 and then Take Route 206 South. Follow Route 206 for approximately 35 miles and make a left onto Route 542 just outside of Hammonton. Follow Route 524 for approximately 8 miles to the entrance to Batsto Village.

Originally a bog iron and glass-making industrial center. It has been restored to reflect the agricultural and commercial enterprises of the late 19th century.

If you are in the area it may be worth a trip but don't take the long ride from Northern New Jersey just to see this site.

Take the Throgs Neck or Bronx Whitestone Bridge to Cross Island Parkway to Northern State Parkway. Take Northern State Parkway to Sagtikos Parkway South to Southern State Parkway East. Take Southern State Parkway East to Heckscher State Parkway South to Montauk Highway (Route 27A) East and take Exit 45E to the Arboretum.

Wildflowers, Rhododendron, Azaleas, Dogwood and Lilacs.
Open Wednesday through Sunday from 10:00 AM to 5:00 PM.

Bombay Hook National Wildlife Refuge

Take the New Jersey Turnpike South to the end and proceed across the Delaware Memorial Bridge. On exit from the bridge look for signs to Route 13 South and take this into Delaware. (They are in the process of bypassing Route 13 with Route 1 so you will have to follow the signs to Smyrna.) In the town of Smyrna you can look for the large sign to Bombay Hook or take Route 12 east. Route 12 will merge with Route 9 in approximately 5 miles. Follow Route 9 and make a left onto Whitehall Neck Road and follow that to the Visitors Center.

A wildlife refuge full of birds. From October through November there are 100,000 ducks and geese in residence. May and June are special times for shorebirds in their migration. During the fall Delaware hunting season parts of the Refuge are closed to non-hunters so you better check before you go to see if it is open to the public.

Boscobel

Take the Bear Mountain Bridge across the Hudson and make a left onto Route 9D. About 9 miles on your left will be the entrance to Boscobel.

A restored 1808 Federal style house with flower gardens in the spring (April - daffodils, May - tulips, June - roses). Up the road is the town of Cold Spring, right below Boscobel is the Constitution Marsh Sanctuary, on Route 9D is also the Manitoga Nature Center and in the vicinity is an excellent restaurant, The Plumbush Inn.

Take Interstate 80 West to Interstate 287 South. Take Exit 17 on Interstate 287, which is Route 202 South. Take Route 202 South approximately 19 miles to Route 179 South. Watch for the sign for Lambertville and take a right and go through town across the Delaware River into New Hope, PA and make a left onto Route 32. Take Route 32 South approximately 5 miles and Bowman's Hill is on your right.

Branch Book Park

Take the Garden State Parkway South to Exit 148 Bloomfield. At end of Exit 148 make a right onto John F. Kennedy Drive. Make a right at the first traffic light onto Belleville Avenue. Go approximately 1 1/2 miles and make a right onto Franklin Avenue. Go approximately 1/2 mile and the park entrance road is on your left.

Visit in April when 2700 Japanese Cherry trees bloom with pink and white blossoms.

"Brigantine" - Edwin B. Forsythe National Wildlife Refuge

Take the Garden State Parkway south to Exit 48. Take Route 9 south to Oceanville and make a left on Great Creek Road. There is a sign for the Forsythe National Wildlife Refuge at Great Creek Road.

An eight mile loop road around the Refuge allows you to stop and photograph migratory and shore birds.

Bronx Zoo

Take the New York State Thruway to Exit 8, Interstate 287, which is also known as the Cross Westchester Expressway. Take Interstate 287 to Exit 3, Sprain Brook Parkway South. Take the Sprain Brook Parkway which ends at the Bronx River Parkway. Continue on the Bronx River Parkway South to Exit 6 which is marked for the Bronx Zoo and you are practically at the zoo gate.

Parking is available on the grounds for a fee.

Brooklyn Botanical Gardens

Take the George Washington Bridge to the Harlem River Drive to the East River Drive. Exit onto the Manhattan Bridge which drops you on Flatbush Avenue in Brooklyn. Proceed along Flatbush Avenue for approximately 1.8 miles after the first traffic light upon exiting the bridge to the Grand Army Plaza and go around the circle (keep the Brooklyn Public Library on your right) to Eastern Parkway and make a right. Follow Eastern Parkway for a very short distance and make a right onto Washington Avenue and right after the Brooklyn Museum you will find the entrance to the parking lot of the botanical gardens.

A botanical garden composed of both outside displays and three inside ones; the Tropical House, the Desert House and the Warm Temperate House. The water lilies display from late June through mid September is especially nice. An added bonus is the Black Crowned Night Heron that perches most of the day on the sign in the Water Lilly pond and totally ignores you. I have gotten different responses about using tripods in the indoor conservatories so you are on your own or you can check in advance by phone. In addition tripods are not allowed in the Japanese Hill-and-Pond Garden. Tripods are however permitted all other places. There is no admission and a \$6.00 (1994 price) parking charge covers off street parking

Butterfly Place at Papillon Park

Take the New York Thruway to Exit 21A/Route 90 East. Route 90 becomes the Massachusetts Turnpike. Take Exit 11A off the Massachusetts Turnpike to Interstate 495 North. Take Exit 35B off Interstate 495 and take Route 3 north for approximately 7 miles to Exit 34. At Exit 34 of Route 3 take Westford Road to the left (southwest). Go through the blinking light at Dunstable Road and take the next left fork which is Swan Road and this becomes Tyngsboro Road. Papillon Park is on the right.

3100 square feet of a glass atrium devoted to butterflies.

Captree State Park

Oak Beach, Long Island, New York

Take the George Washington Bridge to the Cross Bronx Expressway. Take Exit 6B which leads to the Throgs Neck Bridge and take either the Clearview Expressway or the Cross Island Parkway at the other end of the bridge. Follow either road to the Long Island Expressway and take that East to Exit 53. Then take the Sagtikos State Parkway (SA) to the Southern State Parkway (SO) and take that West towards New York City to Exit 40. Take the Robert Moses Causeway (RM) to Captree State Park.

This is the place in mid June for nesting Gulls.

George W. Childs Park

Near Dingmans Ferry, Pennsylvania

Take I80 West to Exit 34 for Route 15 North. Follow Route 15 North and it becomes Route 206. Follow Route 206 to Tuttle's Corner, approximately 20 miles from the start of Route 15, In Tuttle's Corner take Route 560 towards Dingmans Bridge, one of two private toll bridges in the United States. When Route 560 crosses Route 209 it becomes Route 793. A fairly short distance on Route 793 look for the sign to Child's park. (On Route 560 in Layton you will make a sharp right turn following Route 560 and the sign to Dingman's Ferry. On that corner is a luncheonette serving great soup.)

A series of great waterfalls can be found in this park

Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge

Take the New Jersey Turnpike South to the end and proceed across the Delaware Memorial Bridge. On exit from the bridge look for signs to Route 13 South and take this through Delaware, Maryland and into Virginia. Approximately 4 miles after the Maryland Virginia border you will see the sign for Chincoteague directing you to make a left onto Route 175. Proceed on Route 175 across a drawbridge to a T intersection. At this T make a left onto Main Street in Chincoteague and proceed to Maddox Boulevard. Turn right onto Maddox Boulevard and proceed to the entrance to the Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge that is on Assateague Island.

Many birds such as Great Blue Herons, Great White Egrets and at the end of the year, sometime from November on, thousands of Snow Geese. Also famous for the Chincoteague ponies which are rounded up on the island and driven across a channel at the end of July. There are also White-tailed Deer, Sika elk and the endangered Delmarva Peninsula Fox Squirrels.

Clinton Historical Museum

Take Interstate 80 West to Interstate 287 South to Route 78 West to Exit 17 Route 31. Take Route 31 South to Route 173 West and at the same time keep following the signs to Clinton. After crossing Leigh Street and right after crossing the next bridge look for the sign on the right for the Historical Museum and Art Center.

An 18th century gristmill and a country village with a blacksmith shop, general store etc.

Take the George Washington Bridge and follow the signs for the Henry Hudson Parkway North. Use the first exit for Fort Tryon Park, The Cloisters.

A branch of the Metropolitan Museum specializing in the art and architecture of medieval Europe. The cloisters offer some interesting photography. Tripods are not allowed on the weekends after noontime.

Take Interstate 80 West to Interstate 287 South to Exit 7, Weston Canal Road. Proceed south on Canal Road. Do not cross Weston Causeway but turn left and continue along the canal until the road turns left onto Weston Road. Make the first right onto Mettler's Road and continue to Colonial Park.

A 144 acre arboretum and a large rose garden with 4000 roses.
If you are in the area stop in but I would not ride an hour to see it!

Constitution Marsh Sanctuary

Follow the directions to Boscobel and just south of Boscobel, within a mile, is a turn off to the right as you are going south onto Indian Brook Road. Follow Indian Brook Road until it makes a very sharp bend and you can see a trailhead leading to the sanctuary. It is somewhat hard to find the first time. If you continue on Indian Brook Road and cross Route 9 you will find a very old and warm inn from 1761 know as the Bird and Bottle Inn. You can make special prior arrangements for a guided canoe tour through the marsh.

Cora Hartshorn Arboretum & Bird Sanctuary

Short Hills, New Jersey

Take the Garden State Parkway to Exit 142, I78 West. Take Exit 48 for Rt. 24 West. Get off at the first exit on Rt. 24 which is marked Millburn, Summit, Springfield and you will be on Rt. 124. Take Rt. 124 to Millburn Avenue and make a left. Go one light and make a left onto Short Hills Avenue. Right before the railroad overpass make a left onto Chatham Road. Make a left onto Forest Drive and the arboretum is near the top of the hill on Forest Drive.

A small arboretum with wildflowers (supposedly the best Lady's Slippers display in the area plus other wildflowers. Also good rhododendron and mountain laurel.

Cranberry Festival

Take the Garden State Parkway to Exit 67 and then take Route 554 West to Route 72 West. Turn left onto Route 532 to Chatsworth.

There are three tours to the Cranberry bogs on the Saturday and Sunday of the Festival and that is the only way that you can get into a bog to photograph while they are harvesting. The tour bus costs \$12.00 (1991 price), leaves at 10:00 AM, Noon and 2:00 PM and only allows about 20 minutes to photograph the harvesters. Held in October, cranberry harvest time.

For tours of the Ocean Spray plant call 609 726 1907. I am not sure this is open anymore due to insurance liability.

Echo Lake

Directions: If traveling north on Route 23 look for the water filtration plant on the left shortly after entering West Milford. A short distance farther you will make a right onto Echo Lake Rd. If you are traveling south on Route 23 you will take the jughandle for Echo Lake Rd. shortly after passing the Charlottsburg Reservoir wall on the right. Cross over Route 23 through the traffic light onto Echo Lake Rd. Take Echo Lake Rd. for about 1 mile and then make a left into the Newark Watershed Office driveway. The office is open 8 - 4 on weekdays all year and 8 – 12:30 on Saturdays from April 8 thru October. If you are 62 or older a nice person in the office will sell you a hiking permit for \$4.00 which is good thru December. If you are under 62 it costs \$ 8.00. This permit allows you to hike on all the approved trails in the 35,000 acre Newark Watershed. You get a map with the permit. Read and heed the “Rules and Regulations” on the backside of the map. Do not wander around watershed property without a permit. The enforcement people take their jobs seriously.

Fauna: Whitetail Deer, Mink, Beaver, Bullfrogs, Green Frogs, Wood Frogs, Pickerel Frogs, Water Snakes, Garter Snakes, and Copperheads.

Flora: Coltsfoot, Fringed Polygala, Indian Pipes, Pinesaps (Sept), Shinleaf, White Baneberry, and May Apple.

Fungi: Chicken Mushroom, Turkey Tail, Giant Puffball, Coral Fungi, Golden Pholiota, Bleeding Mycena, Shaggy Mane, Jack-O- Lantern, Split-Gilled Mushroom and others.

Fleetwood Museum of Art and Photographica

Take the Garden State Parkway to Exit 140, Route 22 and take Route 22 West for approximately 12.5 miles. Take the Plainfield overpass to get onto Somerset Street going South and make right onto Greenbrook Road and the museum is between Clinton Avenue and Rock Avenue.

Nothing to photograph but the museum is supposed to have a collection of early classic cameras.

Fort Dix Army Base

Take the New Jersey Turnpike to Exit 7. Take Route 206 South for a very short distance to Route 68 and then follow that to Fort Dix. At the first traffic circle in Fort Dix go 270 degrees around the circle and follow the sign to Wrightstown. You will be on Wrightstown Road and the flower fields will be on your right just before the next traffic circle at Delaware Avenue. There are more on the base so hunt them up and anyone will lead you to them.

Fields of planted flowers; Poppies, Black Eyed Susans etc. This is not the Fort Dix that I remember. The flowers peak in late June early July.

Fort Lee Historic Park

Take Route 4 towards the George Washington Bridge and near the bridge take the exit marked Fort Lee, Palisades Parkway and Route 46. You are then on Bridge Plaza Road and at the very end of this road is Hudson Terrace. Make a right onto Hudson Terrace and you will very shortly see the entrance to the park on your left.

A historic park providing information and displays of the role of Fort Lee (named after General Charles Lee) in the American Revolution. Revolutionary War reenactments are held here generally in November. Also nice views of the George Washington Bridge.

Take Interstate 80 West to Interstate 287 South to Madison Avenue Exit 35 and bear RIGHT onto Rt. 24 WEST, to center of Morristown. At the Morristown Green look for County Rt. 510 WEST. Turn Right onto 510 WEST (Washington Street) and go one mile. Turn RIGHT onto Kahdena Road. Entrance to Fosterfields is at top of hill on LEFT.

A farm from the late 1800s that is maintained in working condition with animals and farm buildings. A place filled with many farm scenics. Also contains the residence of the wealthy New York business man that bought the farm.

Open Thursday through Friday, Saturdays and Holidays 10:00 AM to 5:00 PM. Sundays from 1:00 to 5:00 PM.

At Ridgedale Avenue turn right and proceed North on Ridgedale Avenue to Hanover Avenue which is the first traffic light. Turn right on Hanover Avenue and watch for Arboretum on the right.

125 acres of arboretum and flower gardens. There are wildflowers in the spring

Gardens at Wyckoff

Take Route 17 to Lake Street Ramsey. Lake Street becomes Main Street in Ramsey and then become Wyckoff Avenue. Travel on Main Street through Ramsey onto Wyckoff Avenue in Mahwah. On Wyckoff Avenue 0.6 miles past the intersection with Forest Road make a left onto Crescent Avenue. The gardens are on your left just a little bit after the left turn.

Very nice rose gardens.

Take the New York State Thruway to Exit 16 Harriman and take Route 17/6 West to Exit 124B in Goshen. Make a right onto Route 207 and follow to the first traffic signal at South Church Street and make a right. Make the next left onto Park Place and the track entrance is at the end of this block.

You can get into the track to see the morning workouts from spring to fall and also meander through the stable area. There is a short racing season on the July 4 weekend.

Great Falls

Take Interstate 80 West to exit 57C Main Street Paterson. Make a left onto Main street and make another left onto Grand Street (at the corner of Saint John's Cathedral) and then a right onto Spruce Street. Follow Spruce Street one block past Market and make a right onto McBride Avenue and there is a parking lot immediately on your left for the Falls.

In addition to the Great Falls there is also an historic manufacturing district nearby and the Paterson Museum.

Take New Jersey Turnpike South to Exit 7A. Take Interstate 195 West (Trenton) to Exit 60B/I-295 North (Princeton). Take I-295 North to Exit 65B/Sloan Avenue West. After exit stay in right traffic lane for 2/10ths of a mile, following signs for **Grounds For Sculpture**, and take the jughandle to cross over Sloan Ave. Go through the traffic light onto Klockner Rd. Take Klockner Rd. to next traffic light and turn right onto East State St. Extension. Go 8/10ths of a mile and make second left turn onto Sculptors Way. Go 2/10ths of a mile and turn left into the main entrance of **Grounds For Sculpture**.

The grounds are filled with interesting sculptures and nice scenics. There is also a great restaurant named Rat's.

Take Route 17 South and at the exit for Route 3, stay on Route 17 South, look for the signs to the Environmental Center and DeKorte Park.

Bird life of the New Jersey wetlands is available for photographing. There is also a walk along a dike through the wetlands.

Hang Gliders

Take the New York Thruway to Exit 16 Harriman. Take Route 17 West approximately 23 miles to Route 302, that is 4 miles past Interstate 84. Take Route 302 North approximately 10 miles to Route 52 at the light in Pine Bush. Make a left onto Route 52 and go approximately 9 miles and as you get near the top of the mountain look for the parking areas on your left looking out into the valley. If the hang gliders are flying you can see them from here. Also you can find the pilots road up to the top jumpoff, it is 0.6 miles after Cragmoor Road on Route 52 North. Also the landing field is interesting. To get to the landing field follow Route 52 into Ellenville and then go south on Route 209 and make a left onto Hang Glider Road which is 3/4 of a mile past the entrance to the Nevele hotel.

Harriman State Park

Suggestions:

1) Park at the Reeves Meadow Visitors Center and take the Pine Meadow Trail, red blazes, a very short distance to Stony Brook on your left. As you drive in the parking lot at Reeves Center the trail is off to your left at the back of the parking lot. It is a short easy walk to Stony Brook.

To get to Reeves Meadow Visitors Center take Route 17 North through Sloatsburg to the second traffic light and make a right onto Seven Lakes Drive and go approximately 1 1/2 miles to the Center which is on your right.

2) Pine Meadow Lake, a 2 mile trail walk, not too strenuous but it is a trail. Pick up the Pine Meadow trail, red blazes, at the Reeves Meadows Visitors Center and follow to Pine Meadow Lake. You should have a trail map.

3) St. John's Chapel also called the Church in the Wilderness. Take Route 17 North through Sloatsburg and turn right at the second traffic light which is Seven Lakes Drive. Take Seven Lakes Drive to Lake Welch Drive which starts at Seven Lakes Drive and go approximately 1 1/2 miles to St. John's Road and you will see the church.

4) Perkins Tower. Take Perkins Memorial Drive off Seven Lakes Drive near the Bear Mountain Inn end of the park. Very nice views of the Hudson River and the Bear Mountain Bridge. You can drive all the way to the top.

5) If you like a little climb try the view from the top of Daters Mountain. Take the Kakiat trail, white blazes, to the Blue Disc Trail, blue blazes. You will need a trail map.

6) Try the Seven Hills, Raccoon Brook Hills, HTS (Hillburn-Torne-Sebago) trail loop for variously hued outcroppings topped with Pitch Pines. You can find this loop from the Reeves Brook trail off the Reeves Visitors Center.

7) Take the Long Path trail from the parking area off Route 6 to the top of Long Mountain for some nice views of Turkey Lake.

8) Look for the outlaw Claudius Smith's Den at the intersection of the TMI (Tuxedo – Mt. Ivy) and Blue Disc trails. Claudius was known to steal horses from the local farmers and hide out in the den. Reach the TMI trail from the RD (Red Disc) trail on the SE side of Interstate 87 in Tuxedo. This site offers some interesting rock formations and varied flora

The Hudson Palisades is probably the premier natural geological feature of our region, surprisingly underused by photographers. There are two major paths the Long Path and the Shore Trail.

The Long Path is accessible from the Park Headquarters off Route 9W in Closter, from the Interstate Lookout in Alpine as well as from the two lookouts on the Palisades Interstate Parkway. The Long Path is a relatively easy walk along its 11 miles at the top of the cliffs. Views abound all along its length and surprising fields of naturalized garden flowers are encountered in the spring, reminders of great estates that once lined this cliff.

The Shore Trail can be reached from either of the two boat basins (parking fee in summer, closed in winter). The Shore trail is a relatively easy walk along its 11 mile length, except for the mile or so near the stateline known as the Giant Stairs where rock climbing is required. Of interest are Greenbrook Falls, best viewed during the spring run-off and as an impressive ice mass in winter, several profiles of the cliffs and headlands in the north along Bombay hook, the rocky vistas of the Giant Stairs and the vista from Forest View landing.

Flora: Ladies' Tresses (Sept.), Steeple Bush, Meadowsweet, Moth Mullein, Indian Pipe, Pinesap, (late Aug. – early Sept.), Trout Lily, (April or May), and Canada May Flower.

Fungi: Many species (July-Oct.).

Take the New Jersey Turnpike to Exit 7A and then follow the signs to Six Flags Great Adventure.

This is a Theme amusement park but the real jewel is the Safari. It is a drive through Safari that has a lot of animals that are well cared for and in good photographic condition. The drive through is arranged with three lanes so that you can pull over and park on either side of the road to take picture and still keep the middle lane open for traffic that wants to proceed. The official rules state that you are not allowed to lower your car windows and the road is patrolled by park personnel.

The theme park is worth a day of photographing especially at night with the lights on the rides.

The Theme Park is not inexpensive and the cheapest tickets that I could find were available through AAA. Call to determine the open dates as the park closes for the winter season

Take Route 17 North and in between Hillburn and Sloatsburg there is a right hand turn off for Ringwood. Follow this road which becomes Sloatsburg road and past the Ringwood State Park entrance for Ringwood Manor you will see a left for Skylands Manor.

There are a number of different gardens on the grounds including a very nice wildflower garden.

Take the New Jersey Turnpike Extension to Exit 14, the first one after crossing the Casciano Memorial Bridge. Look for Route 440 or Route 169 South, it is labeled differently on the maps than on the road. Take this road across the Bayonne Bridge and take the first exit for Richmond Terrace. Take Richmond Terrace east, you may find a detour in one spot, for approximately 2 miles and look for Snug Harbor on your right. The Botanical Gardens are in Snug Harbor

The gardens are a shadow of those in the New York and Brooklyn Botanical Gardens. I found the New York Chinese Scholars' Garden very interesting to photograph. They told me at the ticket booth that I could not use a tripod but once inside no one bothered me.

This site is not a highlight but if you are out of places to photograph it might be worth a try.

Take Interstate 80 West into Pennsylvania. Approximately 15 miles after the Delaware Water Gap take Interstate 380 West to Interstate 81 South (you will start seeing signs for Steamtown at this point). Take Exit 53, which is the Central Scranton Expressway. At the first traffic signal turn left and this road bears right and becomes Lackawanna Avenue. Follow Lackawanna Avenue through a few traffic signals and look on your left for the entrance to Steamtown that is Cliff Avenue.

Forty acres that occupy the old Delaware, Lackawanna and Western railroad yards. This site run by the National Park Service (Golden Age Passports are not honored) is devoted to the history of steam trains and contains a number of working steam engines, passenger and freight cars. They allow tripods and encourage photography.

Stone Harbor Bird Sanctuary

Take the Garden State Parkway to Exit 10B and turn left. Continue on that road over the bridge into Stone Harbor and make a right onto Second Avenue. Second Avenue is at the Stone Harbor water tower. Continue on Second Avenue to 115th Street and this is the best viewing area.

Very nice during May and June for the Heron nesting season.

Make a right onto Route 301 and go 2.7 miles past the intersection with Route 9 and on your left you will see the entrance to the gardens.

Open April through October on weekdays and the 1st and 3rd Saturdays from 10:00 AM to 5:00 PM.
Entrance fee \$5.00.

Great wild and cultivated flowers. Tripods are allowed and the staff is real friendly.

Storm King Art Center

Stay on Rt. 32 North for 9.6 miles and you will pass over an iron bridge. Right after the bridge make a left onto Orrs Mills Road. Go a short way and look for Old Pleasant Hill Road on your left and make a left. Look for the entrance to Storm King Art Center on your left. Current (2001) admission is \$9.00 Per person, \$7.00 senior.

Beautiful grounds with many stabiles (the stable form of a mobile) from various artists. Use your ingenuity to create something of your own from an artists work or just photograph for yourself. Also beautiful grounds to photograph.

Nice views of the widest part of the Hudson, the Tappan Zee. Written permission is required to use a tripod on the grounds and no photographs are allowed inside the house. For tripod permission contact Nancy Gold or Burns Patterson at 914 631 8200.

Take Route 23 North through the town of Sussex. Just past the hotel there will be signs for the airport.

An air show that takes place usually the last Friday through Sunday in August. The show opens with sky divers and contains mostly stunt flying. W.W.II aircraft is also flown during the day.

A fee is charged.

Sussex County Farm Scenics

Take Route 80 West to Route 15 North. At Ross Corner make a right onto Route 565 North. Make a big loop using Route 565 to Route 23 North and then Route 519 South thru Branchville to Route 206 South which brings you back to Route 15 South at Ross Corner. Approximately 2 miles after turning onto Route 519 from Route 23, take a right hand turn onto Route 649 (Luscroft Road) which takes you past some nice white barns (small calf houses) and red barns and rejoins Route 519. When you reach Route 519 turn right past Space Farms Zoo and continue on Route 519 to and thru Branchville.

Also go North on Route 23 beyond Route 519 into High Point State Park. Three tenths of a mile past the entrance to High Point is a road to the left - Sawmill Road (bear left at the first fork) and in 2 miles see Sawmill Lake on left. A hiking trail goes around the lake. Continue on Sawmill Road 3 more miles to Route 650. Make left and you will be back to an intersection with Route 519, or continue more miles to Route 23.

On Route 565 there is a nice barn that you can find by turning onto Plains Road off Route 565 looking for the first right turn at the intersection of Davis Road. Also further on Plains Road make a right turn onto Myer Road where you will find a white barn at the intersection. Further on Myer Road thru the stop sign the road becomes Wyckertown Road (Route 629) where you will find a nice red barn. Get lost and you will find more nice farm scenics.

If you want to venture into Pennsylvania, take Route 206 South past Branchville, cross the Delaware at Montaque and take Route 209 South a few miles to a sign (Raymontskill Falls). Take the road to the right up the hill and watch for a parking area on left with restroom facilities.

Anyone who recognizes this area will realize that you are in the Becker's back yard.

Take the right fork, which is Orchard Drive, and follow that for approximately 1.5 miles and you will see a sign for a left into the racetrack grounds.

You can no longer get onto the track to photograph and you have to do so from behind the fence.

The National Mall - West

On the mall you will find enough to keep you busy for several days. The mall is anchored on the east by the **Capitol**, with the **Supreme Court** and the **Library of Congress** nearby, and on the west by the **Lincoln Memorial**. The **Reflecting Pool** lies east of the Lincoln Memorial, with the Washington Monument beyond, the new **World War II memorial** in between the Pool and the Monument, and the **Vietnam Memorial** to the north of the Pool. Between the Monument and the Memorial is an excellent area to wander around, looking for pictures. As usual, the early bird (or the late one) gets the best pictures in this area. It tends to be crowded.

I have not been to the top of the **Washington Monument** in some years, but the last time I was there, photography was hampered by smeary glass in the windows. A little Kleenex and some lens cleaner might be helpful. A recent newspaper article said that four of the eight windows were now blocked by security cameras.

The National Mall - East

Between the **Washington Monument** and the **Capitol**, the mall is a long strip of grass, bordered by trees and then by the museums of the Smithsonian and the **National Gallery of Art**. You'll probably want the standard travel shots of the Capitol and Washington Monument from that vantage point. Incidentally, the Capitol has no back. It has an "east front" and a "west front." From the Mall, you are viewing the west front. Photographically, probably the most interesting building on the mall is

the "Castle," the original building of the **Smithsonian Institution**. Behind the castle, there is a Victorian-style formal garden. The new **East Building of the National Gallery of Art** is another popular subject for cameras.

In most cases, your camera is welcome inside the museums, but your tripod is not likely to be. Depending on the security situation the Capitol grounds are worth a stroll to look for photographs. Leave your tripod behind if visiting the Capitol. You need a permit to use one anywhere on the grounds.

Capitol Hill, east of the Capitol, is an area of restored old houses that might reward a stroll with your camera.

Botanical Garden

Another productive site for photography, which visitors often miss, is the **Botanical Garden**, located on the south side of the mall, at the foot of Capitol Hill. The **Botanical Garden** includes the Conservatory, the National Garden, and Bartholdi Park. The Conservatory features a wide variety of living exhibits, including seasonal exhibits. Approximately 4,000 plants are on display. The National Garden features plants native to the Mid-Atlantic region, as well as a Butterfly Garden, Rose Garden and First Ladies Water Garden. Bartholdi Park is an outdoor garden demonstration landscape and includes the historic **Bartholdi Fountain**

Tidal Basin

The Jefferson Memorial lies south of the Washington Monument, across the Tidal Basin. One of our favorite places to take visitors is the **FDR Memorial**, which is on the west side of the Tidal Basin. Good after dark. There are no cherry blossoms of significance within the FDR, but they border it along the Tidal Basin, and if the Basin is calm, you might want to try a night shot of the Washington Monument, framed by the cherry trees. You'll need flash, of course, to illuminate the trees. If I were going to try to do a sunset shot, that would also be one I would look at.

Cherry Blossoms

I think the cherry blossoms are best shot in the early morning. It is best to be on site and ready when the sun comes up. Probably the best place to start is on the east side of the Tidal Basin, across from the Jefferson Memorial. You have the Memorial as a point of interest with the cherry blossoms to frame it. Then you can move around from there and shoot as you see a good composition. Bring flash. It tends to be a bit dark under the trees, and you need flash to cope with the range of light. It goes without saying that you need tripods, too, to get adequate depth of field for a lot of shots. Watch for interesting people shots, too!

There are other trees along **Haynes Point**, south of the Tidal Basin and I-395 (which becomes 14th st.). Not as famous a site as those beside the Tidal Basin, but worth exploring if you find the TB trees lacking.

Arlington Cemetery

Arlington Cemetery, the Tombs of the Unknowns, the Kennedy grave and the **Custis-Lee Mansion** are west of the Lincoln Memorial, across Memorial Bridge. It has its own Metro stop, or you can park there, and a shuttle bus will take you around the cemetery. Stay for the changing of the guard at the Tombs, on the hour (best lighting in afternoon). For a general shot of Washington, see the overlook in front of the Custis-Lee Mansion. The tour of the mansion is also worth the time. I guess I would think in terms of the afternoon, when light will be more or less behind you and from the right.

Downtown

Not far from the Mall, **The National Portrait Gallery** and the **Museum of American Art** often have photographic exhibits of interest.

Union Station is an interesting place at visit, and to find lunch. It was once a train station in the grand scale; now, the trains are relegated to a small part and most of the building, restored, is occupied by shops.

The Kennedy Center is not far from downtown. You may want travel pictures of the building itself, as well as the bust of JFK in the main foyer. There are nice views of the river and Georgetown from the Terrace, on the floor above the main foyer.

Alexandria

Alexandria was a thriving town before Washington's day, and the old part of town has been preserved. For photography, I particularly recommend the residential streets near the river, south of King Street. Christ Church (Washington worshiped here) and Gadsby's Tavern (Washington ate here) are other worthwhile stops. Requires a metro ride.

Cherry Blossom Festival Parade

Floats, balloons, marching bands and other entertainers are all part of the parade. The Parade steps off at 10:00 AM and marches along historic Constitution Avenue between 7th and 17th Streets, NW.

Sakura Matsuri - Japanese Street Festival

Held during the Cherry Blossom Festival

From sushi to origami, from sumo to sake—

Japanese arts and crafts and products of all kinds—

Anime, manga, and J-POP music—

Traditional dances and the dramatic taiko drums—

If it's Japanese, it's at the 48th Annual Sakura Matsuri, the largest Japanese Street Festival in the United States. Genrally held on Pennsylvania Avenue from 14th Street in the west to 10th Street in the east —and on 12th street from Pennsylvania southward to Constitution Avenue.

The Washington Cathedral.

Good architectural shots. They don't seem to object to tripods, as long as you are respectful in using them. Go on Saturday, since there are likely to be services on Sunday that would restrict your ability to work inside. There is a garden adjacent. A bit off the beaten path.

The National Zoo

A 20 minute metro ride. Free admission. Worth a visit to the Giant Panda Habitat.

White House, the Ellipse and Lafayette Square

Some interesting architecture, the Old Executive Office Bldg, and the Treasury Bldg.

Take the George Washington Bridge to the Henry Hudson Parkway North. Get off at Exit 21, marked 246th and 250nd Street. Remain on the service road to 252nd Street and make a left at the overpass across the Henry Hudson Parkway and then make another left on the service road on the southbound side of the parkway. At this point you will have seen a number of signs to Wave Hill. At 249th Street make a right and at the end of that road is Wave Hill. (The entire trip is through a very nice and exclusive section of the Bronx.)

A house and gardens overlooking the Hudson River. There are a number of gardens, unfortunately in the prime ones, the Flower Garden and the Wild Garden, tripods are not permitted. They are also not permitted in the greenhouse either. There is also an art gallery on the premises.

Open Tuesday through Sunday from 9:00 AM to 4:30 or 5:30 PM depending on time of year. Admission is \$4.00 (1995 price) and parking is included.

An English strolling garden and a museum featuring antique period furniture collected by Henry du Pont. The museum tours may require advance ticketing depending on the season. An interesting side trip if you are in the area for Longwood Gardens.

A fee is charged for admission to the gardens and for the museum tours.

Woodland Beach Wildlife Area

Kent County, Delaware

Follow the directions to Bombay Hook National Wildlife Refuge and this area is just north of Bombay Hook. Take the New Jersey Turnpike South to the end and proceed across the Delaware Memorial Bridge. On exit from the bridge look for signs to Route 13 South and take this into Delaware. In the town of Smyrna you can look for the large sign to Bombay Hook or take Route 12 east. Route 12 will merge with Route 9 in approximately 5 miles. At this point take Route 9 North instead of going to Bombay Hook and look for the sign to the Woodland Beach Wildlife Area on your right. The sign and the road you are looking for is 0.8 miles after the intersection with Route 6. Do not follow the signs to Woodland Beach.

A wildlife area where we found a very large flock of Snow Geese adjacent to the road. You are asked to stay in your car while observing the birds. Also go a very short distance past the turn in road and go to the observation tower which is a great place to photograph from if the geese are in the ponds.
