

21 339 Main Street -Whitehead House Old Brick Lot - built in 1815 for Lelias, one of the five daughters of Thomas Smith, about the time of her marriage to Joseph B. Whitehead. 22 334 Main Street -Hillyer House Miss Esther Hillyer's house

may have been built as early as 1837 23 330 Main Street Johnson House Built for Robert W. and Rosa Lee Milby Johnson

about 1880. 24 318 Main St. -**Circuit Parsonage** Lot owned by the Isle of Wight Circuit United Meth-odist Church of the Virginia Conference since 1879. The house was probably built about that time. 25 314 Main St. - Barrow House Built after 1873 for

308 Main St. · **Charles Nelms House** Built by Charles F. Nelms, a local contractor, for his family around 1899. He built many of Smithfield's elaborate Victorian residences and some of the left-over pieces are said to have been used in his own home.

Atkinson Storehouse Built in 1826 and converted into a residence around 1900. Now a retail shop. 8 203 Main St. - Jordan House Built for Watson P. Jordan about 1830 on the site of a much older home. It was the home of J. P. Andrews from 1876 to 1922, and the home and office of Dr. Rae Parker who practiced medicine in Smithfield from 1922 until his death in 1948. After sitting vacant for over 30 years and falling into disrepair, the home is

9 112 S. Mason St. Miles Cary House Before 1800 this two-story residence was added to a small Dutch-roofed house that was later moved to the back of the lot, and then

30 113 S. Mason St. -Mary Jackson House Built about 1760 as a small Dutch-roofed house. Mary lived for only six months after the house was built. Originally the house was a Dutchroofed colonial building, consisting only of the sections on the right side of the porch. 31 117 S. Mason Street Original part of house was built by James F. Chalmers in the 1870's or 80's. Victorian additions made by Everard M.and Julia W. Todd, who owned and occupied it from 1888 to 1908. 32 Cedar Street & S. Mason Street - Trinity United Methodist Church

1898 replaced an earlier frame church. 05 S M

3 301 S. Church St. original house of the Windsor Castle Built before 1750 by Arthur Smith, IV, founder of Smithfield. A stuccocovered brick home with dormer-windowed second floor and full basement. Most likely not the grant from the King of England.

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plantation patented in 1637 to the third son of Arthur Smith of Blackmore, Essex, England. The Town of Smithfield was laid out on a portion of Smith's original land

60 357 S. Church St. -Cowling-Barrett House Built about 1825, it used to have stables, a small school-house, three Victorian gazebos and numerous arbors, trellises and brick walls in its back vard.

**59 352 S. Church Street** General Washington and Patrick Henry during the believed to have been built as early as 1800 by Thomas Blow. Later in 1827, the widow of Gen-Smithfield eral Francis M. Boykin & Isle of Wight resided here. General County Boykin served with both

Built in the 1880's or 90's, it once had a wide front porch. 53 338 S. Church St. -Andrew Mackie House Built about 1796. it features a beautiful colonial-style formal garden sloping to Little Creek, with boxwoods,

gazebo and Chippendale benches. 52 335 S. Church Street The original part of this home is believed to have been built by Andrew Mackie after he purchased the lot in 1758. Mackie and his family occupied the house until 1778, when he sold it to Captain John Sinclair. Sinclair occupied the house from 1778-1796. 51 334 S. Church St. -**Goodrich House** Built about 1886, elegantly Victorian and distinguished by Smithfield's only Mansard roof and colored glass cupola. 0 331 S. Church St. -

Chapman House Once the site of Congressman Robert Whitfield's law office, now torn down, it has been a residence since 1904. 49 318 S. Church St. Built in 1881 as a residence for R. E. Bovkin. At the turn of the century, this home was painted a dark chocolate brown. 309 S. Church St. -William D. Folk House Built in 1876 and painted dark red during Victorian times, it was the home of Smithfield's Mayor Folk from 1884-1893, home of Howard W. Gwaltney, mayor 1950-61, and is currently the home

of Florine H. Moore,



44 220 S. Church St. -Eason-Whitely House One of the first lots to be sold in the new town of Smithfield in 1752. It went for 4 pounds, six shillings! James Eason first occupied the house in 1756. Home of the Whitley family from 1913 to 1988.

Smithfield's first woman mayor, elected in 1986. 47 304 S. Church St. -Pembroke Decatur Gwaltney, Jr. House This house is the epitome of the Queen Anne style of Victorian architecture. The house, completed in 1901 took two years to build with its turrets, towers, gables, stained-glass windows, bay windows, tiled roof, portecochere, and cabinet mantles (inlaid in mother of pearl). P. D. Gwaltney, Jr. re-established the meat curing and packing company started by Mallory Todd. 6 226 Ś. Church St. -Pembroke Decatur Gwaltney, Sr. House Victorian in style, built in 1876. P. D. Gwaltney, Jr. founded the peanut business in Smithfield. 5 223 S. Church St. -Holloway House Frected in 1897 in the typical Victorian style of the period.
